

Seeds 4 to 6 years old

Exploring the Wonders of Allah's Creations

This theme focuses on introducing students to the concept of Allah as the Creator and showcasing the beauty and diversity of the world around them. Through this theme, students can develop an understanding of their place in the world as part of Allah's creation, while also learning the foundations of Islamic values, teachings and practices. Lessons and activities will revolve around nature, animals, plants and the importance of gratitude and kindness in our interactions with Allah's creations. This theme encourages a sense of wonder, curiosity and appreciation of Allah's blessings and provides a strong foundation for their spiritual and ethical growth.

Sample Lesson Plan

Learning Objectives	Learning Context	Cornerstone
 Surah Fatiha Teach Surah Fatiha in a manner that incorporates nature and the child's world and hence can foster an understanding and deeper connection with its meaning. 	 Engage students by asking them to observe and appreciate their surroundings in nature and take note of elements of nature such as trees, flowers, birds and water. Focus on sounds, textures, sizes, colors and beauty. Encourage students to share their observations and relate them to the themes found in Surah Fatiha, such as gratitude, praising Allah and recognising His blessings in nature. Introduce Surah Fatiha as a special chapter in the Quran that teaches us how to praise Allah and ask Him for guidance. Breakdown a simple translation of Surah Fatiha and explain the meaning of keywords and phrases. Open discussion on how students' connect with Allah and make dua. Discuss the power of dua Develop activities that encourage students to use art to express what they are grateful to Allah for Gather the students in a comfortable informal space and play different recitations of Surah Fatiha and encourage them to listen attentively and follow along with translation, if possible and notice and reflect on how it makes them feel. Emphasize the importance of expressing gratitude to Allah and seeking His guidance. Encourage students to recite Surah Fatiha with appropriate pronunciation and Tajweed 	 Basics of Belief Ways of Worship

Roots 7 to 9 year olds

Theme: Strong Faith and Strong Character

This theme focuses on building strong foundations of faith and strong foundations of character by using the stories of the Prophets to teach students the importance of values, virtues and ethical principles. Each Prophet's story can be used as a platform to discuss moral dilemmas, decision making and the importance and application of these values in their own lives. This theme will not only impart Islamic teachings but also help students develop a solid moral foundation and understanding of the significance of character development in their lives as Muslims. Roots will also be the level where the students' foundational practices are developed and strengthened.

 Salah Understand the importance and significance of Salah. Students should know how each Salah is different and what are the times we pray 	 Discuss the reason why we pray and why it is important to pray at the prescribed times Use arts and crafts to have students make charts on the different prayer times and the benefits of Salah Breakdown the structure of Salah and go over each detail until the student is familiarized. Have discussions and use worksheet or arts and crafts to convey what is acceptable during Salah and what is not Visit the prayer hall and observe/partake in prayer 	 Basics of Beliefs Ways of Worship

Sample Lesson Plan

Learning Objectives	Learning Context	Cornerstone
 Surah Hujurat Understand the history, context, meaning and significance of this Surah 	 Discuss the significance and context of this Surah Discuss what it means to be a friend and what behaviors/manners are not considered Islamic (this can lead into conversations about friendship groups, peer pressure and bullying and how to stand up for what's right) Arrange students in small discussion circles in a natural outdoor setting. Provide them with discussion prompts related to the themes in Surah Hujurat, such as respect for elders, resolving conflicts, and building unity. Encourage students to share their thoughts and ideas in a relaxed, open environment. Encourage students to reflect using journaling Assign students to role play different scenarios where they need to demonstrate respect, empathy, and unity. Share stories from Islamic history or personal experiences that highlight the importance of respect, kindness, and unity. Ask students to retell the stories in their own words and discuss what lessons they can draw from them. Take a nature walk and have a group discussion afterward about the importance of respect in our interactions with both nature and other people 	 Basics of Belief Ways of Worship Manners and Morals
